# **UPDATE ON WHERE WE ARE IN 2023**

Last time I wrote a State of the Port feature we were wrapping up 2022 and closing the book on an uneventful storm season that allowed us to embark on our many repair projects without interruption. I am happy to report that as of today we are putting the finishing touches on most of our repair projects with one of the critical pieces being the return to our administration building in Cut Off. With all the exterior work completed, we are only left with a few remaining items on the interior in advance of us relocating our day-to-day operations back into our repaired and more resilient building by mid-May at the latest.

While returning to 100-percent of our operational and physical capabilities is great news, this only scratches the proverbial surface of all the exciting things we get to report on right now.

February saw a pair of huge announcements that bode well for not only the future of the Greater Lafourche Port Commission, but Port Fourchon and the entirety of Lafourche Parish.

Between Crowley signing a Right of First Refusal on a large tract of bulkheaded property on Slip C to a historic purchase agreement paving the way for the GLPC to acquire more than 850 acres in Port Fourchon, these announcements truly mark a distinct turning point for the port and region.

It is my anticipation that the property under Right of First Refusal will be leased within the next several months as Crowley works with prospective businesses interested in teaming up with their leadership group to begin the process of

developing the Gulf region's first purposedriven offshore wind facility.

The agreement to purchase the Caillouet Land acreage is a deal that will not only immediately bring about additional leases and revenue to the GLPC but will also serve as a major catalyst for us to build a bridge and connector road to our Fourchon Island project.

project that will provide more expansive industrial access to the Gulf of Mexico through its unique configuration and development plan.

Along with this purchase comes the news that the Caillouet family is donating 165 acres of property to the State of Louisiana with the intention the state will eventually create its 22nd state park on the southernmost tip of Lafourche Parish.

Beside this, we continue to see daily progress being made at our South Lafourche Leonard J. Miller, Jr. Airport thanks to a new seal coat, obstruction removal project, the beginning of a new terminal building with surcharging of the land, and an Airport Bridge & Connector Road project, which is roughly a year away from being completed. This bridge and connector road will provide safe and reliable access from the airport to Highway 3235 for daily commuters and large-size trucks alike, and more importantly, a new and more reliable access point for the community as a whole.

Further work includes construction of the final leg of the elevated portion of LA 1 from Golden Meadow all the way down to Port Fourchon.

At the same time, we continue to press

forward with planned projects to enhance our existing Coastal Wetlands Park and Recreation Area in the Port that will ultimately connect to our new Fourchon Pavilion on Flotation Canal, which is now complete and ready to start welcoming visitors this summer.

Engagement with and interest in Port Fourchon has never been more robust As a reminder, Fourchon Island is a than now as we reconfirm our claim on being a leader for all offshore energy activity in the Gulf of Mexico whether it be offshore wind or otherwise. Yes, you heard me right, we plan to be a hub for ALL offshore energy activity in the Gulf of Mexico because our tenant businesses have the know-how and people to accomplish any and every goal put in front of them today and into the future.

Our staff's weekly and monthly calendars have had to have fields added to accommodate the appointments, conferences, visits, and other activities that have consumed our daily lives. Let me make it clear that this is what we consider a "good busy." This ambitious schedule is certainly a credit and direct result of our Board of Commissioners and staff doing an amazing job making us shine brightly as an organization.

As we continue marching forward through 2023, I feel as confident as ever that additional announcements will not only demonstrate how Port Fourchon is far from done, but rather prove the point we are forging ahead toward a new and prosperous future with our current tenants serving as the backbone upon which all these additional opportunities will surely flourish in the years to come.

# HISTORIC PURCHASE AGREEMENT TO BENEFIT PORT FOURCHON AND COMMUNITY AT LARGE

The Greater Lafourche Port Commission, Caillouet Land, LLC, and the Caillouet family announced in early February they had entered into a purchase agreement which will result in the Port Commission purchasing over 850 acres of land south of Leeville, most notably including all Caillouetowned industrial property in Port Fourchon.

According to GLPC Executive Director Chett Chiasson, the \$36.7 million purchase will bring an immediate **\$1.4 million** annual net benefit when considering yearly rent savings and new rent collections.

"More than anything else, on behalf of the Commissioners

and myself, I want to thank the Caillouet family for being so supportive of Port Fourchon through the years," Chiasson said. "Both parties gave this agreement great thought, and we mutually felt this was the best way forward for Port Fourchon as we embark on an ambitious future of growth and tremendous promise."

**GLPC Board President Chuckie** Cheramie added, "This is a great day for the Port and this area in general. This will truly be a beneficial deal that will have a positive impact on our area starting today and for many years to come."

will include unrestricted access to Fourchon Island, paving the way for construction of a new Fourchon Bridge, and will leave the property situated within Port Fourchon.

The new Fourchon Bridge will connect Port Fourchon with the nearly 1000-acre Fourchon Island project, which will provide more expansive industrial access to the Gulf of Mexico, increasing harbor depths to accommodate larger vessels, rigs, platforms, and a burgeoning offshore wind energy marketplace.

"Due to the financial discipline and keen insight of our Board of Commissioners, the stage was set for this moment in time," Chiasson said. "We have continued to budget conservatively each year, putting us in the financial position to make this investment in our community. This practice has allowed us to weather difficult times. In addition to

accommodating requests for short-term rental adjustments in order to maintain the services offered by our tenants, we have been able to strategically leverage our funds into better grant-matching opportunities and, ultimately, this significant land acquisition which benefits Port Fourchon and our entire region."

The land being purchased has been owned by the Caillouet Family since 1895. In 1962, the family donated about seven acres of land to improve navigation in Bayou Lafourche. A year later, an additional 160 acres was donated by the family to enable the creation of Port Fourchon.



The sale, which is expected to close within the next several months, will leave the Caillouet family with about 165 acres in the vicinity of Fourchon Beach that are intended to be donated to the State of Louisiana for the creation of a state park. With the construction of the new Fourchon Bridge, the park will provide open space and recreational areas for public enjoyment. The funding mechanism and land acceptance for the proposed Caillouet-Fourchon State Park will be put before the Louisiana Legislature for consideration in its upcoming session, and the parties

anticipate finalizing the donation later this year.

"The generosity of the Caillouet family's planned donation Port Commission as the exclusive manager of all industrial of this land to potentially create Louisiana's 22nd state park will provide people with additional options for exploring our Louisiana coastline. While the planning process is still underway, this area could prove beneficial to families looking for a fishing excursion or just simply a beautiful place to camp along the shores of the Gulf of Mexico," said Lieutenant Governor Billy Nungesser.

Tom Durel, President of Caillouet Land added, "Through these actions the Caillouet Family expresses appreciation to the men and women of lower Lafourche who over the years have helped preserve and make Fourchon into the major economic enterprise it is. The Caillouet-Fourchon State Park will celebrate their side-by-side achievements of conservation and industry."

# FOURCHON PAVILION TO OFFER OPPORTUNITIES FOR RECREATIONAL ACTIVITIES GALORE



The GLPC Board of Commissioners are constantly looking out for its community and its best interests.

The recently constructed Fourchon Pavilion is a perfect example of this, as the multi-purpose pavilion will offer much in the way of opportunities for locals through fishing tournaments and other recreational activities.

The pavilion is located on Flotation Canal Road across from the Coastal Wetlands Park in Port Fourchon.

"This idea was initiated by our Board of Commissioners who had a desire to

see a building that could comfortably hold community events in a scenic setting," GLPC Executive Director Chett Chiasson said. "We all feel like this will be an amazing addition to the port and works well in conjunction with the Coastal Wetlands Park that is adjacent to the pavilion. It is our full intention to build a walkway along the outer perimeter of the wetlands park to connect both these features in the coming months."

The pavilion, which was self-funded and paid for by the GLPC, will have the

ability to hold a variety of events with power hookups. While the pavilion has an open-air concept around the lower half of its wall, the ability exists to put skirting and close it in to run airconditioning if needed.

Several upcoming fishing rodeos, including a Fourchon based one where the money raised goes to local nonprofits in the form of grants for schools is one such example of how this pavilion will benefit the public in the near and long-term.

# THOMAS PITRE III SWORN IN AS SEAT B COMMISSIONER

Newly elected Port Commissioner Thomas "Tom" Pitre III was formally sworn into office by Lafourche Parish District Attorney Kristine Russell on February 8, 2023, officially taking his place at Seat B during the Greater Lafourche Port Commission's monthly board meeting.

Commissioner Pitre was the only candidate to qualify for Seat B, winning unopposed in advance of the March 25, 2023, special election. Pitre was previously appointed to Seat B to fill the spot that had been held by Johnny Ordonne.

Board President Chuckie Cheramie welcomed the board's newest elected member, saying, "We are more than happy to have you on board."

Executive Director Chett Chiasson added, "We congratulate Tom and look forward to working with him into the future as he moves from being an appointee to an elected port commissioner."

Tom Pitre is a well-known business leader in the community, running family business Tom's Service Station in Golden Meadow. He and his wife Hope have three children and seven grandchildren.






